For & With Children

At The Institute, our work for and with children explores the strengths and needs of children by engaging in projects focused on the brain, learning, communication, and social-emotional wellbeing.

For & With Families

At The Institute, our work for and with families aims to impact caregiving and family interaction through projects focusing on family systems and dynamics, and family capacity building.

Initiated in January 2023 through support from the Tower Foundation, the **Pathways Program** brings together families, professionals, and community members for a deep exploration of diversity, equity, and belonging. Guided by facilitator Djenne-amal Morris, participants report having a powerful and transformative experience. Following the end of the program in June, we will engage in scholarly work to capture, scale, and share outputs from this work.

This program is an opportunity to workshop with open-minded individuals with various backgrounds, experiences, and stories. It provides a safe space to teach, learn, and grow as a leader and an advocate for our children and others.

In late spring, The Institute welcomed Martina Curtin, a visiting scholar from the UK. Martina, a Speech and Language Therapist (SLT), is currently pursing her doctorate in Deafness & Communication with an emphasis on clinical research. She is co-creating a new tool to observe parents as they interact with their deaf children, ages 0-3.

Of her time at The Institute and the Children's Center for Communication/Beverly School for the Deaf (CCCBSD), Martina reflected,



I was fortunate to spend time both in the Parent Infant Program (PIP) and CCCBSD classrooms, and see how passionate the specialised teachers and support staff are with the children. It was a joy to see wonderful multi-disciplinary work between therapy and education staff. 

For & With Professionals

At The Institute, our work for and with professionals aims to impact research-informed practice through programming that enhances professionals' knowledge and skills, and promotes growth and leadership.

At CCCBSD, a Deep Dive is a professional development program that offers faculty an opportunity to ask big questions and explore big topics. This spring, the final Deep Dive of the school year focused on family engagement. Over the course of several months. faculty explored the benefits and barriers to authentic engagement with families. Additionally, faculty learned from experts, engaged in individual and team reflection, and attended panel presentations from the Pathway Program members.





At The Institute, we are interested in tools-such as the universal design for learning (UDL) frameworkthat foster the design of impactful learning experiences. To this end, Drs. Brandt and Szarkowski published a chapter on UDL in the book,

Strategies for Promoting Independence and Literacy for Deaf Learners With Disabilities. This practitioner-focused text will be useful to practicing teachers and higher education faculty who are preparing the next generation of Teachers of the Deaf.

Additionally, in March, Dr. Brandt presented Harnessing All of UDL to Promote Independence in Learners with Complex Special Needs at the UDL-Implementation & Research Network International Summit.

For & With Society

At The Institute, our work for and with society aims to center individuals with valuable lived experience through programming that focuses on diversity, equity, and belonging, and all-abilities advocacy.

This spring, four individuals presented to CCCBSD faculty as part of the Deafness, Disability, & Diversity Representation series. This program centers those with valuable lived experiences reflective of the students and families we serve.
